Equal Employment Opportunity Non-Discrimination Policy

It is the policy of the City of Kent to provide equal employment opportunity for all qualified persons, regardless of sex, race, color, ancestry, religion, national origin, ethnicity, age, disability, sexual orientation, medical condition, military status or any other category protected by state or federal employment law. Our commitment includes ensuring a nondiscriminatory workplace where individuals are valued for their differences, as well as their similarities.

Every City employee, and every person engaged in business with the City, have an ongoing responsibility to create a nondiscriminatory work environment through their personal conduct.

Responsibility for the implementation of the City of Kent's Equal Employment Opportunity Nondiscrimination Policy rests with the Human Resources Manager. However, all department heads are responsible for carrying out this policy within their departments. The City Manager expects each department head, manager, and supervisor to ensure compliance with this policy.

Nondiscrimination Statement

The City of Kent, will ensure that no person shall be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination under any of its projects, activities, or services, and business opportunities on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, sex, gender identity, sexual orientation or disability as afforded by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and related statutes, as amended. All persons, regardless of their citizenship status, are covered under this regulation.

I. Introduction

The City of Kent's (City) mission is to provide public infrastructure and municipal services to protect and enrich the daily lives of residents in the City.

The City receives a wide array of federal funding from the Federal Highway Administration, among other federal agencies. As a recipient for such federal aid, the City is required to comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Title VI).

Title VI states that:

"No person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, national origin, sex, age, disability, religion, sexual orientation, or gender identity be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance."

The City is committed to complying with Title VI requirements for all programs and services delivered to the public. This Title VI Program (Program) serves as a guide and reflection of the City's commitment to preserving the civil rights for all individual and group benefactors of City programs and services.

The Program includes a general overview of how the City will:

- Handle a Title VI Compliant.
- Engage public participation.
- Provide services to Limited English Proficiency populations.
- Train employees and managers in recognizing Title VI situations.

II. Policies and Regulations

In accordance with Title VI, the City will ensure that no person shall be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination under any of its projects, activities, or services, and business opportunities on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, sex, gender identity, sexual orientation or disability as afforded by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and related statutes, as amended. All persons, regardless of their citizenship status, are covered under this regulation.

III. City Overview

The City is governed by a City Manager appointed by an elected Mayor and Council of nine members. The City is a full service city with over 200 full time and 75 part time employees and 14 departments with 6 divisions.

IV. Demographics

The following table details the primary languages spoken at home among the residents age 5 years and older that reside in the City with a population of 28,496.

V. Title VI Program

Title VI Coordinator

The City has a Title VI Coordinator who is responsible for the overall Title VI Program. The Title VI Coordinator's role is to lead in the development and implementation of Title VI Program and coordinating compliance across each department and division within the City. The Title VI Coordinator provides guidance and technical assistance on Title VI matters and has overall program responsibility for preparing reports and developing program procedures, which include:

- Promptly processing and resolving Title VI complaints.
- Overseeing the collection of demographic data (race, color, national origin, sex, age, and disability) of participants in the beneficiaries of the City's Federal-aid programs, activities, and services.
- Promptly resolving areas of deficiency.
- Conducting periodic Title VI audits.

Title VI Requirements

The City developed a wide range of procedures to meet the general requirements of Title VI. They include the following:

- Posting Title VI notifications at public counters, Internet, etc.
- Publishing brochures.
- Address and filing Title VI discrimination complaints.
- Training staff on Title VI law and requirements.
- Providing access to LEP populations.
- Providing information and outreach to ensure Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) involvement.
- Providing contract opportunities to minority businesses.
- Meeting environmental justice regulations.
- Adhering to service standards.

This Title VI Program includes guidelines for meeting HUD, FAA, FHWA, and FTA requirements.

Notice of Rights

The City of Kent will display the "Notice of Rights" for public view at all locations within City facilities with customer counters, and on the public website. The notice states that the City will comply with Title VI and ensures that no person on the grounds of race, color, age, sex, disability, gender, or national origin be excluded from the participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any of our programs, activities, or services.

Examples of City of Kent's Notice to the Public are in Appendix A.

Complaint Procedures

Any person who believes that he or she or a specific class of individuals has been subjected to unlawful discriminatory practice under Title VI by the City may, on his/her own behalf or by an authorized representative, file a complaint under this procedure.

No person who files a complaint, nor any person who cooperates in the investigation of the complaint, shall be subjected to retaliation, and the City shall take reasonable steps to protect such persons from retaliatory actions.

Persons having a complaint are encouraged to first contact, by telephone or in person, the Title VI Coordinator to attempt to informally resolve the complaint. If this does not yield a satisfactory resolution, a complaint form may be filed.

Complaint forms are available at Utility Billing public counters, City Administrative Offices, and online. The complaint form is included under Appendix B. Complaints must be filed in writing and should be directed to:

Complainants may submit their complaint form to the City or to an external federal or state agency, such as FAA, FHWA, or FTA. However, should a complaint be filed with the City and one the federal or state agency simultaneously, the federal or state complaint will supersede City's complaint and the City's complaint procedures will be suspended pending the other agency's findings. Every effort will be made to obtain a timely resolution of complaints.

The following procedures will be followed to investigate formal Title VI Complaints:

- A. The complaint must meet the following requirements:
 - 1. Complaint shall be in writing and signed by the complainant(s). In cases where complainant is unable or incapable of providing written statement, a verbal complaint may be made. The investigator assigned to the case will interview the complainant and assist the person in converting verbal complaints to writing. All complaints must; however, be signed by the complainant or his/her representative.

- 2. Include the date of the alleged act of discrimination, date when the complainant became aware of the alleged discrimination, date on which the conduct was discontinued, or the latest instance of conduct.
- 3. Present a detailed description of the issues, including names and job titles of those individuals perceived as parties in the complaint.
- 4. Federal and State law requires complaints to be filed within 180 calendar days of the alleged incident.
- B. Within 14 business days of receiving the complaint, the Title VI Coordinator will determine its jurisdiction, sufficiency, need for additional information, and investigate the merit of the complaint. The complainant will receive an acknowledgment letter informing him/her whether the City's Title VI Coordinator has accepted or rejected the complaint.
- C. Once the Title VI Coordinator approves the complaint for investigation, the complaint will receive a complaint number and the complaint will be logged identifying: complainant's name; factual allegations; and alleged harm, race, color, and national origin.
- D. If more information is needed to evaluate the claim, the Title VI Coordinator may contact the complainant. The complainant has 10 business days from the date of the letter to send requested information to the Title VI Coordinator. If the Title VI Coordinator is not contacted by the complainant or does not receive additional information within 10 business days, the Title VI Coordinator may terminate the investigation and close the complaint.
- E. In cases where the City investigates the complaint, within 90 calendar days of the complaint, the investigator will issue either: 1) a closure letter or 2) a letter of finding (LOF). A closure letter summarizes the allegations and states that there was not a Title VI violation and that the complaint will be closed. A LOF summarizes the allegations, and informs the complainant that the Title VI Coordinator found the complaint to have merit and it will take appropriate corrective action to remedy the matter.
- F. If the complainant is unsatisfied with the decision, he/she may file an appeal with one of the following appropriate federal agency for their decision.

G. The Title VI Coordinator will maintain a list of Title VI Complaints it receives. Examples of Title VI Complaint Form are in Appendix B.

Requirement to Record and Report Title VI Investigations, Complaints, and Lawsuits

In compliance with 49 CFR Section 21.9(b), the City shall prepare and maintain a list of any active investigations, lawsuits, or complaints naming the City of Kent and alleging discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, religion, disability or income status. This list shall include the date the investigation, lawsuit, or complaint was filed and received by the City, a summary of the allegation(s), the status of the investigation, lawsuit or complaint, and actions taken by the City in response to the investigation, lawsuit, or complaint.

The City of Kent's form for recording this information is included in Appendix C. The list shall comprise all of the records of active investigations, lawsuits, and complaints recorded on these forms. During the processing of active investigations, lawsuits, or complaints, the Title VI Coordinator shall update the record form as necessary. Upon resolution and closure of an investigation, lawsuit or complaint, the Title VI Coordinator shall record such closure on this form.

Public Participation Plan

The City is committed to ensuring that projects, programs, and services delivered by the City are sensitive to the various demographic backgrounds within the City.

As a recipient of Federal funding, the City is required to adhere to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The City is committed to ensuring it serves the residents and businesses of the City fairly, consistently, and in the most cost-efficient and appropriate manner within available resources.

A. Goals and Objectives

The goal of the City is to offer a variety of opportunities for the public to engage in planning and decision-making activities.

The City's objectives are as follows:

- To determine what non-English languages and/or other barriers may exist to public participation within the City service area.
- To provide a general notification of meetings for public input, in a manner that is understandable to all populations in the service area.

- To hold meetings in locations that are accessible and reasonably welcoming to all area residents, including, but not limited to minority, Limited English Proficiency (LEP), and low-income members of the public.
- To utilize a variety of communication methods to capture public input from populations that are not likely to attend or engage in public meetings.

B. Environmental Justice

In accordance with Executive Order 12898 (Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations), the City will identify and address the environmental effects of programs, policies, and activities on minority and low income populations. The City will consider demographic data into their project design and involve the public in the planning and development process to assess the environmental impacts of projects on the community. The public's input and data analysis enable the City to develop measures to mitigate any potential adverse effects on minority and low-income populations. The City is not required to conduct environmental justice analyses of projects where NEPA documentation is not required.

C. Limited English Proficiency Populations

A LEP individual is someone with limited ability to read, write, speak, or comprehend English. Reasonable efforts will be made to engage LEP populations utilizing techniques, such as the development of public notices in appropriate non-English Languages that will provide contact information where individuals can be informed of the affected project or services to provide input and comments. Other efforts may include conducting focus groups in areas with high concentrations of LEP populations for the purpose of gaining input from a particular defined portion of the community. In addition, non-profit organizations and other advocacy groups can be utilized to disseminate and provide insight into the needs of LEP populations.

D. Low-Income Populations

The City will identify low-income populations within the service area. The low-income threshold will be defined as households with a per capita income of 80 percent or less of the national average. Low-income populations in the City will be given reasonable opportunity to provide input on plans and programs to avoid disproportionate harm or lack of benefit.

E. Public Comment Process Offered by the City Council

The public has a right to express their opinion during the regular Council meetings held the third Wednesday of every month at 7:30 p.m. The meetings are held in the Council chambers at 320 S. DePeyster Street, Kent (Fire Station #1. Lower level). Information about City Council is available on the City website at:

F. Outreach Efforts

The City will also provide the public an opportunity to comment to community meetings via online platforms. The City will engage the community through the City's website, social media, and brochures placed at the library, community centers, public parks, and recreation areas within the communities. The City staff and/or a contracted non-English interpreter for LEP will attend community meetings to inform residents of the City's services and provide them an opportunity to express their input in a language they are comfortable communicating in upon request.

Appropriate techniques among the following will be used to inform, educate, and gain input from the public about the City's projects, services, or activities:

- Surveys or questionnaires mail-in, online, telephone, personal interview and/or door-to-door
- Comment cards at all public meetings, presentations, workshops, etc.
- Articles or press releases in the appropriate publications
- Timely consultation with advisory committees and councils
- Distribution of informal reports, flyers, or brochures
- Informal presentation at regional sites, open houses, or other community forums
- Formal presentations to various service clubs and civic and professional groups
- Information about meetings, public hearings, and special events on the City's website
- Direct mailings to those expressing interest in or commenting about certain topics
- General mailings with posters and flyers to area post offices and appropriate agencies, offices, and organizations for distribution to citizens.

G. Minority Representation on Public Bodies

Title 49 CFR Section 21.5(b)(1)(vii) states that a recipient may not, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, "deny a person the opportunity to participate as a member of a planning, advisory, or similar body which is an integral part of the program."

The key advisory and policy-making bodies for the City of Kent are listed in Appendix D. The City will seek to identify individuals who could bring diverse perspectives to Kent Boards and Commissions, and whose names could be put forward when a seat becomes open.

Limited English Proficiency Plan

To comply with Title VI, it is important to identify the demographics and specific language needs of the City's residents and businesses. This information is set forth in the demographics table on page 2.

The City developed a general LEP Plan for use by any division to address the public's language needs. The LEP Plan outlines how to identify reasonable steps for providing language assistance to LEP persons who wish to access services provided by the City of Kent. The LEP Plan also identifies language assistance needs, the ways in which assistance may be provided, staff training that may be required, and how to notify LEP persons that assistance is available.

To prepare the LEP Plan the City referenced the U.S. Department of Transportation's four-factor LEP analysis, which considers the following factors:

- A. Number and proportion of LEP person served or encountered in the eligible service population.
- B. Frequency with which LEP persons come in contact with City of Kent programs, activities, or services.
- C. Nature and importance of services provided by the City of Kent to the LEP population.
- D. Resources available to the City of Kent and overall cost to provide LEP assistance.

The figures on page 2 under Demographics detailed the breakdown of English fluency for people who speak another language and what the top primary languages are in the City.

Training

The City will provide Title VI training to employees of the City. These trainings are offered at minimum every two years. Trainings will be offered online or through an instructor-led class. Additional resources are provided on the City's website to enhance the learning objectives. The following components will be covered to ensure compliance.

- A. Review of the City's Title VI Policy and LEP Plans.
- B. Types of language assistance services offered to the public.
- C. How to handle a potential complaint.
- D. Where to seek assistance for Title VI questions and concerns.
- E. Some employees will be provided training on DBE and Americans with Disabilities Act compliance, as necessary.

Title VI Construction Contract Provisions

The City Service Department will include the provisions indicated in the specific contract agreement executed with ODOT for each federally funded project in contracts and agreements, where applicable, between the City and contractors.

Federal-aid construction contracts currently include provisions, which require compliance with Title VI. The specific contract provision language is included in the FHWA From 1273 that is physically inserted in the federal-aid construction contract.

The "Local Public Agency Construction Contract Administration Primary Roles and Responsibilities" confirms that DBE and labor/Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) compliance requirements are performed and documented in the project files.

The "Local Public Administration (LPA) Construction Contract Administration Manual" details the responsibilities of the City for DBE and EEO compliance issue related to Federally Funded Projects overseen by ODOT>

Data Collection

Demographic and related data collected and used by the City comes from governmental sources responsible for collecting and vetting the information for consistency and accuracy.

Goals and Accomplishments

The Service Department will annually establish and monitor program goals and accomplishments. The Title VI Coordinator will ensure that employee training is conducted, language translation services continue to be available, public participation is optimal, and appropriate Title VI signage is posted. This also includes updating community statistic and corresponding with the federal agency as necessary.

APPENDIX A

Your Rights Under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 requiring that, "No person in the United States shall on the grounds of race, color, age, disability, gender, or national origin be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination against discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance.' In addition, related statues provided protection against discrimination on the grounds of age, sex, or disability.

Any person who feels that he or she, individually or as a member of any class of persons, on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, sex, or disability has been excluded from or denied the benefits of, or subjected to discrimination caused by a City of Kent employee may file written complaint with the City's Title VI Coordinator. Federal and State law requires complaints be filed within 180 calendar days of the alleged discrimination.

Re: Committee of the Whole discussion on verbatim transcription of visitor's portion of Regular Council Meetings

At the August 15, 2018 Regular City Council meeting, Mr. Sidoti moved to place into the Committee of the Whole a discussion on transcribing visitor's comments verbatim during the regular meetings, which was seconded by Mr. DeLeone for discussion purposes only. Mr. Sidoti felt this would be in fairness to the visitors so the average citizen could read minutes and actually hear what those people said, not necessarily just an overview; Mr. DeLeone and Ms. Shaffer disagreed; Ms. Wallach commented how it may be an unreasonable request; Ms. Rosenberg asked if instead of verbatim, if there is the possibility of greater detail or a "gradient" inclusion of visitors' comments. Mr. Kuhar asked why we just don't archive the audio longer and use that for verbatim, if requested.

As your fully credentialed Master Municipal Clerk of Council (MMC), with 7 years of being a professional technical legal secretary for felony prosecutions, 5 years of intense certification, training and attaining my Master Municipal Clerk designation, as well as being a 3 year instructor of an "Effective Minutes" class to municipal clerks around the state, I am providing the following facts and my professional opinion against verbatim transcription, especially of the visitors' portion:

 As stated in the Kent City Council's Standing Rules "Public Comment" Section G(1)(b), the City already provides visitors an opportunity to submit their own verbatim statement, in writing, to be included as an attachment in the minutes, especially if they are unable to complete their statement in the allotted 3 minutes. This process has been extremely successful and appreciated by the visitors.

"(1) Audience Participation:

(b) Content. Public comments shall focus on a specific matters within the Council's jurisdiction. Members of the public are encouraged to present written comments in advance of the meeting, as a way to fully communicate their thoughts on agenda or non-agenda items. When written materials are presented, they should be submitted to the Clerk of Council for distribution prior to the Council meeting. If materials are submitted to the Clerk of Council during or after comments, the materials will not be distributed to Council until after the adjournment of the meeting. Written statements will be included in the minutes as Attachments."

 According to the Ohio Sunshine Laws Open Meetings Act and the most recent training I received from attending the Auditor of the State of Ohio's training as Council's designee: "C. Minutes

1. Content of minutes

A public body must keep full and accurate minutes of its meetings. Those minutes are not required to be a verbatim transcript of the proceedings, but they must include enough facts and information to permit the public to understand and appreciate the rationale behind the public body's

<u>decisions</u>. The Ohio Supreme Court holds that minutes must include more than a record of roll call votes, and that minutes are inadequate when they contain inaccuracies that are not corrected. A public body cannot rely on sources other than their approved minutes to argue that their minutes contain a full and accurate record of their proceedings."

- 3. The Ohio Revised Code Section 121.22 (C) 2nd paragraph states:
 - "(C) The minutes of a regular or special meeting of any public body shall be promptly prepared, filed, and maintained and shall be open to public inspection. The minutes need only reflect the general subject matter of discussions in executive sessions authorized under division (G) or (J) of this section."
- 4. The newly adopted Records Retention Schedule, after Council's request of the Records Commission, provides for the audio recordings of Council's meetings to be kept for one year which suffice as verbatim recordings of each and every meeting. Once a New City Hall is built which will include modern technology and with the building of the City's new website, Council will have all the appropriate means to provide better transparency and access to recordings and/or real-time interaction with our meetings.
- A Court reporter or professional transcription service would need to be hired to transcribe verbatim
 minutes from the City's audio recordings for any legal situation that may arise. Many courts in Ohio
 will only hire official court reporters that have completed an accredited program through Ohio court
 reporting schools.
- 6. For two years I have prepared a *hybrid* of summary, detailed and verbatim minutes, with any verbatim statements transcribed with quotation marks; Visitors' full written statements are referred to and incorporated as "attachments" to the minutes per the Council Standing Rules.
- 7. Out of 35 other municipalities throughout the State of Ohio who responded to my inquiry regarding their minutes:
 - 10 municipalities transcribe summary minutes of only the legislative action.
 - 17 municipalities, transcribe a *hybrid* of summary and detailed minutes dependent on the intensity of the topic at hand.
 - 3 municipalities, along with us, transcribe a *hybrid* of summary, detailed and verbatim minutes, especially when it comes to items that affect the legislative outcome or are an intense legislative topic.
 - 3 municipalities transcribe detailed minutes..
 - 2 municipalities transcribe verbatim: one clerk is forced to by ordinance, the other clerk is new and until recently thought she had to transcribe minutes that way. That particular clerk performs no other clerk of council duties than transcription of minutes because of the amount of time it takes.
- 8. Verbatim transcription of any type requires an inordinate and unwarranted amount of time and does nothing to assist in conveying the legislative outcome of a meeting. Recently, one 12 minute verbatim visitor interaction took over 2.5 hours and 6 pages to transcribe. Every "um", sidebar comment, and cross-talk has to be accounted for. Council had 7 visitors at the last meeting, who spoke for a total of 36 minutes, not 21 minutes because sometimes Council allows visitors a bit more than their 3 minutes to finish their sentence. 36 minutes can convert to a full 7.5 hours of transcription just for the visitor's comments section of Council's minutes.

For the above reasons, it is my professional opinion that Council does not have me transcribe the visitors' portion of the Council or Committee meetings and allow me to continue to transcribe in the manner which I have for Council for the previous 2 years to protect the integrity of the Council, staff, visitors, and City as a whole.

353.03 PARKING PERMITS.

- (a) No person shall cause, allow or permit any motor vehicle owned by, registered in the name of, or operated by such person to park such motor vehicle upon any street designated in Section 353.02, or any Municipal Parking Lot as regulated in Chapter 355 between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. for a period of more than two hours without having obtained a currently valid City of Kent parking permit. (Ord. 2007-37. Passed Apr. 18, 2007)
- (b) The Director of Budget and Finance is hereby authorized to create procedures and guidelines for the issuance of City of Kent overnight parking permits, including sale by private vendors in the downtown area.

(Ord. 2007-37. Passed Apr. 18, 2007)

- (c) The Director of Budget and Finance, or his/her designee shall issue a permit to park a motor vehicle on the streets designated in Section 353.02 for ten-hour periods upon the following terms and conditions:
- (1) The applicant shall pay a permit fee of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) a month, forty-three dollars (\$43.00) for three months or eighty-five dollars (\$85.00) for six months, and designated as class "A" parking permits.
- (2) The applicant shall pay a permit fee of five dollars (\$5.00) a month for use in specially marked ten hour parking spaces designated as class "B" permit spaces.
- (3) The applicant shall pay a permit fee of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) a month, forty-three dollars (\$43.00) for three months or eighty-five dollars (\$85.00) for six months for special parking areas for overnight parking, or specially dedicated parking, and designated as class "C" parking zones, as identified in Section 353.02.

(Ord. 2007-37. Passed Apr. 18, 2007)

(d) The parking permit shall be affixed in the vehicle on the rearview mirror so as to be visible to the front and rear of the vehicle.

(Ord. 2007-37. Passed Apr. 18, 2007)

(e) The parking permit issued by an authorized representative of the City shall designate the value paid for the permit and shall clearly designate the month and year of expiration. Parking permits may be issued for a maximum of six (6) months.

(f) Payment of the parking permit fee by the applicant as provided for herein guarantees only that the licensee is entitled to park on a space on one of the streets designated in Section 353.02, or designated by postings in municipal parking lots but does not provide the licensee with a specific or particular parking space.

(g) Nothing herein contained shall prevent the parking of a motor vehicle on any of the streets or parking lots set forth in Section <u>353.02</u> or Chapter <u>355</u> hereof without a parking permit for a period of time not to exceed two hours. However, any vehicle parked for a period of time in excess of two hours and not displaying a parking permit shall be subject to the penalty provided for in Section <u>353.99</u>. (Ord. 2007-37. Passed Apr. 18, 2007)

355.01 DEFINITIONS.

- (a) "Motor vehicle" means any device in, upon or by which any person or property is or may be transported upon a highway, except a device which is operated upon rails or tracks.
- (b) "Operator" means and includes every individual who shall operate a vehicle as the owner thereof, or as the agent, employee or permittee of the owner or is in actual physical control of a vehicle.
- (c) "Owner" means the record of ownership as shown in the clerk of courts office of the proper county and shall be prima-facie evidence that the owner placed the vehicle in the parking space at the time and place alleged in the complaint against him/her.
- (d) "Park" or "parking" means the standing of a vehicle, whether occupied or not, upon a public parking lot other than temporarily for the purpose of, and while actually engaged in receiving or discharging passenger(s), loading or unloading merchandise, obedience to traffic regulations, signs or signals or an involuntary stopping of the motor vehicle by reason of causes beyond the control of the operator of the vehicle.
- (e) "Person" means and includes any individual, firm, partnership, association, corporation or other recognized legal entity.
- (f) "Municipal parking lot" means any property owned by the City of Kent which has been designed and improved expressly for the purpose of parking of motor vehicles by the general public, and which has signs identifying it as a municipal parking lot for general use of the public.
- (g) Posting of parking restrictions means the visible posting of signs identifying the limitations on use of parking areas within a municipal parking lot.
- (h) "Parking within designated spaces" means parking a motor vehicle within the painted lines used to identify the width and length of a parking area designated for a single parked motor vehicle.
- (i) "Designated parking space" means a parking space the use of which is dedicated to a specific business, by virtue of contractual requirements at the time of municipal purchase of the property. Such designated spaces shall be identified by individual signs, and use of these spaces shall be by permitted issued to the property owner, or by specific authorization of the designated business.
- (j) "Municipal facility parking" means parking lots dedicated to the specific use of a municipal facility or office, and such parking lot use is limited to official business being conducted at the facility.

355.02 RESTRICTIONS REGULATING OFF-STREET PARKING IN MUNICIPAL PARKING LOTS.

No owner or operator of a motor vehicle shall permit parking of a vehicle in a municipal parking lot in a manner not in compliance with the following restrictions:

- (a) Park any vehicle across any line or marking of a parking space or in such a position that the vehicle is not entirely within the area designated by such line or marking; (parking within designated spaces)
- (b) Parking within designated spaces is allowed for up to ten hours between the hours of 8 AM and 6 PM, park any vehicle in a designated parking space for more than two hours, unless such space is a designated parking space for specific business permit use (dedicated space or ten hour parking space);
- (c) Park in a designated parking space without a permit to qualify as a designated user of the space;
- (d) Park in a designated ten hour parking space, without displaying a valid ten hour parking permit issued by the Police Department pursuant to Section 355.03 of the Codified Ordinances.
- (e) Park in a space designated for handicapped only parking, without displaying a qualifying handicapped permit from the state of registration of the vehicle;
 - (f) Park a vehicle in a city lot between the hours of 3AM to 6 AM:
- (g) Park a truck having an unloaded curb weight in excess of 5,000 pounds, trailer, or semitrailer or commercial tractor.

355.03 POSTING OF PARKING RESTRICTIONS

The Director of Public Service shall prominently post notice of the above restrictions in all municipal parking lots dedicated for public use, and shall maintain all such postings in clearly readable form.

355.04 MUNICIPAL FACILITY PARKING LOT REGULATIONS

- (a) The regulation of parking at municipal facilities shall be limited in the same manner as those restrictions identified in Section 355.02.
- (b) In addition to the above, use of parking spaces at municipal facilities shall be specifically limited to the purpose of conducting business at the municipal facility, and shall be posted as such on the required signs.
- (c) The Director of Public Service shall prominently post notice of the above restrictions in all municipal parking lots dedicated for municipal facility use, and shall maintain all such postings on clearly readable form.

(Ord. 2001-121. Passed 12-5-01)

355.05 REMOVAL OF MOTOR VEHICLES.

(a) Officers of the Police Department are hereby authorized, subject to the conditions set forth in the codified ordinances, to remove or cause to be removed, a motor vehicle parked on any public parking lot between the hours of 3:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. whenever, in the opinion of the officer, the presence of such parked motor vehicle in a municipal parking lot will interfere with street cleaning or maintenance of such parking lot or shall otherwise create a condition detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the City.

- (b) Officers of the Police Department are further authorized, subject to the conditions set forth in the codified ordinances, to remove or cause to be removed, a motor vehicle parked in a municipal parking lot that has excessive unpaid parking violations on file.
- (c) Whenever an officer has removed or caused to be removed a motor vehicle from a public parking lot such removal shall be executed in compliance with Chapter 356 of these codified ordinances.
- (d) Notice shall be posted on all city-owned parking lots advising that vehicles may be towed for parking during the above hours or for failure to pay outstanding parking violations. (Ord. 2001-121. Passed 12-5-01)

- (a) Whoever violates any section of this Chapter, except Section 355.02(a)(4), shall be subject to the penalties set out in Section 351.99(a) of the City of Kent Ohio Codified Ordinances.

The developer of the commercial project under construction at 1005 East Main Street is requesting a variance from the KCO 1339.05(a)(9). This code section requires sidewalk to be constructed across the parcel frontage. This parcel has frontage on all four sides of the property. The request is to eliminate sidewalk on the Crain Avenue side as depicted on the attached sketch. Sidewalks exist on Crain Avenue to the west of Luther Avenue, but do not exist between Luther Avenue and Elmwood Drive. There is a sidewalk on the west side of Luther Avenue. There are no sidewalks on Elmwood Drive nor throughout the University Heights Subdivision.

Installation of sidewalk at the corner of Luther Avenue and Crain Avenue will result in the roots of two trees being disturbed. There are also three trees in the Crain Avenue tree lawn that will be impacted. The Developer is stating the preservation of the trees as the reason for this request.

During the Planning Commission review process, several persons mentioned that they wish to preserve the rural look of University Heights and did not wish to see a sidewalk installed. These conversations are not part of the Planning Commission records but were conversations with Staff.

The Developer has also offered to install a proper handicap ramp on the southwest corner of Luther & Crain Avenues.

For these reasons approval of the variance request is recommended by the Community Development Department.

KCO 1339.09 authorizes the City Manager to decide whether or not to grant appeals and variances. The Community Development Department is recommending this variance and requesting that you grant the variance by signing below. (Please note that you need to notify Council of all variances granted.) Please consider this request on the applicants' behalf.

This variance is granted on the condition that the property owner agrees in writing to install a sidewalk across the frontage of his/her property if or when Crain Avenue improvements are installed that include sidewalk or when adjacent properties install sidewalk.


