RE: 2014 City Auction

Attached is the list of items which are being recommended for sale as part of the City of Kent 2014 Online Auction tentatively scheduled for April 2014. This auction will again be completed by Asset Auctions, LLC using an online auction method. Asset Auctions is still on the State of Ohio Administrative Services bid list and as such the City will not be required to bid the auction services.

Recently Asset Auctions was acquired by Richie Brothers Equipment One which also owns Auctions by Gov further expanding the City's market for sale of our surplus items. The City was previously charged a 5.7% sellers premium however with the new format there is no fee for sellers and a seven percent buyers premium, additionally credit card transactions are treated equal as cash transactions.

Once Kent City Council approves the attached list of items recommended for auction staff will schedule with Asset Auctions to set up the online auction. When the City approves the off line draft auction web page(s) Asset Auction will provide a date for the start and end of the auction. As in the past all advertising and costs associated with the auction will be paid by Asset Auctions, LLC and again staff recommends that the City advertise locally in the Record Courier the dates of the City's Online Auction, which would be an additional cost to the City but would allow local residents to be aware of the auction

In the past after Council has authorized the listed items for auction some items have been identified as being usable by other Departments of the City and it is requested that Council approves the list subject to items being removed from the list as reusable.

Kent City Council is respectfully requested to approve for the sale by auction as outlined above the items on the attached list of and the additional advertising in the Record Courier.

Main Street Kent 2013 Goals & Accomplishments

<u>Events/Marketing Activity</u> – Main Street Kent's collaborative marketing efforts are geared toward bringing people from Kent and surrounding communities to downtown Kent to shop, eat, and experience/enjoy downtown Kent.

<u>Chocolate Walk</u> – Feb. 9: Two hundred tickets were sold at \$15 each. Twenty-four downtown businesses participated in the event. Ticket holders toured downtown Kent, receiving a chocolate treat at each location. Business owners reported seeing lots of new faces, increased sales, and an overall successful event. All proceeds benefited Main Street Kent. We will repeat this event on Feb. 15, 2014, with a goal of raising \$4,000.







- Art & Wine Festival June 1: Wine tasting, art, food, and live music filled the downtown for the seventh year! Thousands of people attended this popular event, and area businesses reported a significantly more profitable day. All proceeds benefited Main Street Kent. Event sponsors included: AMETEK, Kent State University, Secret Cellar, Wild Earth Outfitters and Williams, Welser, Kratcoski & Can, LLC.
 The 2014 event is scheduled for June 7th, and sponsorship has been secured through College Town Kent, Kent State University and Secret Cellar thus far, with others in the works.
- <u>Discover Downtown</u> Aug. 19: In partnership with the Kent Area Chamber of Commerce, this annual welcome event is for incoming students a great opportunity to help get them acquainted with the downtown. Main Street Kent coordinated a scavenger hunt (at ten businesses, spread out around the downtown district) for students to search for answers to specific questions at designated businesses. Completed answer sheets were entered into a drawing for gift cards to downtown businesses. Business owners hear customers say months later that they discovered their business during this event.
 <u>Prize donations were made by: 4Cats Art Studio, Fresco Mexican Restaurant & Salsa Bar, Gracylane and RUSH by Dino Palmieri Salon.</u>
- International Festival Sept. 14: Our third year putting on this event, downtown Kent was turned into a
 multicultural experience including live entertainment, international flavors, and an interactive mural for
 the community to create. A passport excursion was offered to attendees who could go to nineteen
 different businesses for a different cultural experience food samples, art exhibits, crafts, etc. Businesses
 reported heavy traffic all day and into the evening after the event, with some reporting high sales
 comparable to those reached during Heritage Fest in July. Event sponsors included: College Town Kent,
 Hometown Bank, Kent State University, NEOMED, and PARTA.

<u>Family Friendly Halloween</u> — Oct. 25: Every year, Main Street Kent partners with an event planning class
from Kent State University to plan and execute this event. Thirty-four downtown businesses participated
this year, and families were able to trick-or-treat, do Halloween-themed crafts and play games at Earl's
Nest and Hometown Bank Plaza. This was a great opportunity for people to preview where they will shop
for the holidays, and to enjoy a community event.







- Thursday Night Live Concerts These summer concerts were held at the Hometown Bank Plaza, and
 were sponsored by local eateries who handed out free samples of their food at the concerts (along with
 menus and other "freebies.") This gave the community a chance to try different foods and enjoy live local
 music. Event-goers were seen eating treats from many nearby places as well such as ice cream, popcorn,
 etc., supporting local businesses exactly as planned! Concerts were sponsored by: Ray's Place, Pita Pit,
 Dave's Cosmic Subs, and Belleria Pizza & Italian Restaurant.
- <u>Sidewalk Sale</u> July 20: Though the weather didn't cooperate, businesses reported an increase in foot traffic and expressed interest in doing more of these group effort sales. We will plan accordingly in 2014.
- Wish List Weekend In partnership with College Town Kent, Main Street Kent
 helped facilitate participation and promote this holiday shopping season kick-off,
 where people could essentially "register" or pick out the gifts they'd like to
 receive in advance at many downtown businesses.
- Black Squirrel Friday Nov. 29: This year, we held a new special event/shopping day as an alternative to shopping the malls and big box stores. In partnership with College Town Kent, we hosted two "warm up stations" where people could enjoy live music, free gift wrapping, cookies and coffee. Businesses had special offers, drawings, and other activities. A life-size gingerbread man, snowman, and black squirrel Santa roamed the streets, generating excitement and photo opportunities all around town. Thanks to the Kent Community TimeBank, we were able to have the characters around for the entire day!








• <u>Small Business Saturday / Sweet Finds Contest</u> Nov. 30: For the second year, we promoted shopping locally on Small Business Saturday with a promotion called the "Sweet Finds Contest." Shoppers were able to go on a "hunt" in downtown Kent businesses to find a hidden "sweet treat" (picture of a gingerbread man, candy cane, etc.) and then enter a drawing for gift cards to downtown businesses. Many businesses reported their "best sales of the year" on this day.

- Akron Life In partnership with twenty-four businesses and organizations, Main Street Kent coordinated a 20-page section in the November issue of Akron Life magazine. Twenty thousand copies of the magazine were printed and distributed, plus an additional 7,000 copies of the Kent content (like a "mini-magazine") for our use. These are distributed through KSU, Kent State Hotel & Conference Center, local eateries and businesses, hotels in surrounding communities, and other high-traffic areas. "Shop Kent" Campaign – Main Street Kent coordinated a 20-page, pre-holiday, "Shop Kent" tabloid section (an "insert") for the local newspapers. The focus was the reasons to shop locally, and featured advertisements from local businesses to promote shopping, dining and entertainment in downtown Kent. This was distributed to 70,000 households via the Record-Courier, Cuyahoga Falls News-Press, Stow Sentry, Hudson Hub-Times and Tallmadge Express. Design/Downtown Beautification

Adopt-A-Spot – Recruited more volunteers to participate in this growing program. <u>Downtown Clean-Up</u> – April 27 & Nov. 16: Designated clean-up days for downtown – over fifty people volunteered each day from various businesses and community groups. Hundreds of pounds of trash were collected and thousands of cigarette butts cleaned up from streets, tree grates, sidewalks, alleys, etc.
 Plans are in the works to schedule more clean-up days in 2014.





Graffiti Clean-Up – Aug 9: KSU's Department of Recreational Services
partnered with Main Street Kent and the City of Kent's Department of
Public Service in dedicating their annual "Department Day of Service" to

- 1. The first item discussed by the Committee was the impact the Summit Street improvement project will have on Kent State University's parking. The parking areas located at the Recreation Center, Schwartz Center, and Johnson Hall will all be affected for up to three years by the project. The University was interested in temporary parking on the street to make up for some of the lost spaces. The Committee agreed to further look into temporary parking locations once more specific information is received concerning the University's needs. They also agreed that the best method to control the temporary spots would be through the use of parking permits.
- 2. The second item discussed was the Summit Street median crossing locations and the proposed material of the crossings for emergency vehicle use. The Committee agreed that three crossings would be sufficient and that the proposed locations were good for access to north side of Summit Street. It was also agreed that the grass would be better than the rubberized mulch in the median crossings. There will be markers to identify where the grass crossings are located for use by emergency vehicles only. These medians will be maintained by Kent State University.
- 3. The Committee agreed to a no parking restriction on the east side of the newly reconstructed Pine Street between Cherry and Harris Streets. Concerns from residents about the reduced parking have been addressed and corrected through several public meetings. There will be a grace period of 30 days for parking tickets once changes to the ordinance are approved. The amended ordinance will be taken to Council in January.
- 4. A group of residents requested a traffic signal at the intersection of Fairchild Avenue and Silver Meadows Boulevard. That intersection had been studied around 2010, it was only close to warranting a signal during peak times. The residents were told to send their request in writing. The procedure would then be for the City to follow up with a study, traffic crash history report, and finally the priority of that intersection would be compared to other intersections in the City that also need signals. Another resident requested a stop sign on Vine Street at either Oak or Williams Streets because of speeding vehicles. The Committee agreed that stop signs are not used as a method to control speed and that a speed trailer could be placed on Vine Street in the spring to check speed averages and encourage drivers to slow down.

- 5. The fifth item covered by the Committee was to review parking ordinance amendments for E. Erie Street from S. Water Street to Haymaker Parkway and S. Depeyster Street from Haymaker Parkway to E. Main Street. They discussed the difference between a ten minute drop off/pick up spot and a ten minute parking spot. The Committee agreed that the parking ordinance amendments looked good with the addition of Pine Street.
- 6. Lastly, the Committee discussed the interest from new restaurants like Bricco for valet parking services. Bricco is interested in having the service available to their patrons on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights. They would like to use two parking spots in the front of their building on Erie Street as a drop off zone for the service. It was agreed that a permitting procedure will need to be established to control valet businesses coming into the City. Standards will need to be established for liability purposes and the City will need proof of a contract between the valet and the Kent business. The Committee agreed that the City could issue a temporary permit to Bricco for valet services. The City will stipulate that the spots can only be used if they are open after the approved valet service times and that the City will not tow other vehicles parked in those spots for valet use. Additionally, they will be asked to use the City lots as the location to park the vehicles that use the valet service.









FROM THE PREVIOUS STAFF REPORT

The information was insufficient for staff to review, and the application for Planning Commission review and approval was deemed incomplete. However, this project was advertised to be discussed at this evenings meeting. Staff is requesting a motion to table this item until a complete application package has been received.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

The applicant is requesting to utilize the rear yard of the property for parking. This parcel has a history of illegally parked vehicles and other scrap type items in the rear yard. The site plan approved by the Planning Commission depicted parking in the front only. This parcel has been through the legal system twice (1998 & 2003). Obtaining approval for a rear parking area by Kent's Planning Commission will supersede the court cases. From the history, Staff is concerned that unlicensed or inoperable vehicles (junk) will be stored here as well as miscellaneous parts and accessories. The area is also unkempt. Staff suggests adding conditions of approval to restrict the use to licensed and operable vehicles only.

Parking lots are conditionally permitted uses subject to KCO 1171.01(1), (2), (5), (9), (11), and (40) listed below.

- (1) All structures and activity areas shall be located at least 100 feet from all property lines.
- (2) Loudspeakers which cause a hazard or annoyance shall not be permitted.
- (5) No lighting shall constitute a nuisance or in any way impair safe movement of traffic on any street or highway; no lighting shall shine directly on adjacent properties.
- (9) Such uses shall not require uneconomical extensions of utility services at the expense of the community.

- (40) A performance bond or other financial guarantee acceptable to the Planning Commission shall be placed with the City to insure that the landscaping be installed, and that the hard surfacing of the access drives and parking and service areas be installed, and that adequate storm water drainage be installed, all in accordance with the Commission's approved plans.
