2021 ANNUAL REPORT



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2021

The year 2021 got off to a near-tragic start for the Kent Police Department when two officers were shot responding to a call in January. Officers Kyle Auckland and Lenny Kunka were responding to a break-in at a Kent residence when they were assaulted by Dante Dixon, who attacked the officers, shooting both them and himself during the fight. Thankfully, both officers have recovered from their injuries and are back on the job, and Dixon was sentenced to as many as 42 years in prison for the attack.

The KPD administrative team tackled some major projects and underwent some significant changes in 2021.

One of the projects we completed was the transition of our existing policy and procedure manual to the Lexipol platform. Lexipol is a national company that specializes in policy writing for public administration, employing top attorneys in the field of law enforcement, as well as respected risk managers. This service provides policies that are always up-to-date based on current law and industry best practice. Our transition process included review and minor editing of each policy provided by Lexipol to address local issues. Overall, the process took us about a year to complete and, now that we are up and running, it gives us the ability to train and test our officers on a daily basis to ensure that they understand the practical application of our policies.

Another big project we worked on in 2021 was our body camera project. This involved conducting extensive research, including testing and evaluation periods, and obtaining price quotes from several companies. Our administrative team worked to secure grant funding for this project, and once the funding was granted, we were able to move forward with the final stage of the process in early 2022. All patrol officers now wear body cameras during their shifts.

A major change in 2021 was the dissolution of the Portage County Drug Task Force. KPD had participated in that organization for many years, and fortunately we have been able to start the process of putting our drug task force agent into another task force run by the United States Drug Enforcement Administration.

ADMINISTRATION

The administrative division of the Kent Police Department consists of the chief, the operations captain, the services captain, the administrative lieutenant, and the administrative asssistant to the chief. The administrative team is responsible for the police budget of over \$7.6 million, policies and procedures, community policing programs, equipment purchase approval, personnel hiring and development, training approval and scheduling, planning and researching initiatives, special projects, news media, social media, internship programs, and special events.

DETECTIVE BUREAU

The members of the detective bureau aid the patrol division in the investigation of felony and complex investigations, provide support in crime scene processing, and process all the department's evidence. A lieutenant and sergeant command a team consisting of three general case investigators, one drug task force agent, one juvenile investigator, one evidence detective, and an administrative assistant.

PATROL

As with any law enforcement agency, patrol is the backbone of our department. These are the men and women in uniform who respond to calls for service. They are the visible members of the department who work day and night to keep the community safe. Our patrol division is headed by the patrol captain and staffs three primary shifts, with officers working eight-hour days, five days per week. We also maintain officers working a swing shift to overlap during shift change. In addition to standard patrol operations, we have partnered with the Kent City Schools since 2014 to provide a full-time school resource officer to work in the middle- and high schools.

K-9 OFFICERS

KPD expanded its K-9 program in 2021 when K-9 Shaw joined our department. There are now two K-9 teams that assist and support the work of the KPD Patrol division.

TASK FORCES

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GLANCE

KPD participates in various regional task forces. Regional task forces provide us resources we do not have on our own. We participate in the following task forces:

SUPPORT SERVICES

The support services division is headed by the services captain and comprises three major functions within the department. The communications section, otherwise known as "dispatch," consists of 11 fulltime dispatchers and one supervisor. These are the people who answer our phones, both our non-emergency lines and when someone calls 911. They are highly trained to obtain the proper information, relay that information to responding units, and provide emergency medical instructions to callers. Support services also oversees the maintenance of the police building, which requires collaboration with central maintenance and other vendors. Finally, this division is responsible for managing the department's equipment inventory, and was instrumental in the policy update and body camera projects, as well as a project to purchase new consoles for the dispatch center.

COMPLIANCE OFFICERS

KPD has two full-time civilian positions which are responsible for both parking and animal compliance.

DETENTION OFFICERS

Our detention officers are responsible for prisoner processing and maintaining our jail facility.

COMMUNITY

CITIZENS POLICE ACADEMY

The purpose of the Citizens Police Academy (CPA) is for our department to engage with, learn from, and provide education about what we do and the reason we do things. It is not meant to teach participants how to be police officers, but to give insight to the community about our profession.

Our 2020 CPA was cut short because of pandemic related safety measures, but fortunately, we were able to resume the CPA in the fall of 2021, inviting back all the participants from the 2020 class.

BICYCLE PATROL

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The bicycle patrol continues to be a tool used in community policing efforts. Bicycle patrol provides a way for officers to be more approachable for interaction with the public. Often times, officers working under the **Community Development** Block Grant program have the ability to utilize a bicycle. Additionally, officers working in the downtown area sometimes ride bicycles to have more interaction with the public without jeopardizing response time.

As we've done for the past few years, we partnered in 2021 with the Trinity Lutheran Church to co-host "Lord's Lunch" at the church. Police members and volunteers prepared lunch for those in need of a free meal. We plan to continue this worthwhile program for years to come.

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ENGAGEMENT

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KENT POLICE AND CITIZENS ORGANIZATION (KPCA)

The KPCA is a non-profit organization whose mission is to enrich the Kent area community through police support. Numerous gifts and donations were given to various organizations and other fund-raising events throughout the year to benefit the Kent community. Annually, a scholarship of \$1,000.00 is awarded to a deserving RHS graduating senior who is involved in their community. This year's award winner was Kaylie Loughry.

KPCA also hosts the annual fill-a-cruiser event in partnership with Walgreens. The fill-a-cruiser event benefits our local community as all of the donations made through the program are donated to Kent Social Services who serves our local community. In 2021, we also donated a portion of the donations to a charity drive at the Spellman Chapel.

TIP 411

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> Tip 411 is a software program that allows the community to provide anonymous, crime-related tips to our department. During the 2021 calendar year, we received 102 anonymous tips and we anticipate even more to come in as the community becomes aware of the program.

SOCIAL MEDIA

Social media platforms continue to be a necessary method of engaging with our community. Our department maintains social media accounts on Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram.

POLICE EXPLORERS
