

Celebrate Kent! PROGRAM GUIDELINES

PROGRAM GOAL:

To provide new opportunities to celebrate the quality of life enjoyed by City of Kent residents and share with those outside of the community the attributes that make Kent a unique and exciting place to work, play, learn and live.

OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Attract Kent residents, and visitors from other communities to downtown activities and events.
- 2. Promote the City's attributes to those outside of the City.
- 3. Create additional commercial opportunities for businesses operating in the downtown district.

PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. The project needs to be oriented towards attracting people to the Kent downtown district and must be held within the downtown district.
- 2. Applicants must be, or represent, a Kent company or organization.
- 3. Funding is intended to support **verifiable program expenses** which includes hard costs such as materials, advertisements, flyers, printing, etc. <u>Funding for administrative purposes such as salaries, general office supplies, agency overhead, payment for services provided by applicant employees or representatives, etc. will not be considered eligible project costs.</u>
- 4. At the completion of the event(s) the applicant must submit a Statement of Success report to the City of Kent summarizing and documenting the results of the event(s), and explaining how the stated program goals and objectives were met.
- 5. Grant funds will be disbursed on a reimbursement basis only for eligible expenses as identified in the Project Description and Project Budget sections of the submitted application. All invoices must be for good or services specific to the event only and must specify the quantity of the item or service provided. All eligible expenses must be documented through **third-party invoices and proof of payment**. Hand written receipts or bills that are not formalized company invoices will not be accepted. No disbursements will be authorized until the report mentioned in item number 4 has been received by the City of Kent.
- 6. Each dollar of grant funding must be matched with one-dollar from another source, or two-dollars of in-kind contribution. A combination of both cash and in-kind contributions is permissible; however, separate and distinct accounting procedures must be maintained for each of the two sources. Evidence of all matching contributions, be they in-kind or cash, must be verifiable, and accepted by the City of Kent prior to reimbursement.
- 7. Grants must be completed within one year of the date of the executed grant agreement. The final invoice for payment must be submitted no later than **60 days after the funded event occurs** or the applicant will forfeit their grant funds.
- 8. All 2024 *Celebrate Kent!* Grant agreements must be signed within 30 days of notification of grant award.
- 9. If an organization is submitting an application for multiple events, it should submit one application covering all of the events.

Diversity Grants

The term diversity will be applied broadly to include a myriad of focus areas, including but not limited to ethnicity, gender, disability, race, socio-economic status, national origin, religion, sexual orientation, culture, etc.

Events that will be eligible for diversity grant funding consideration will be evaluated to determine if the event will:

- 1. Promote diversity and inclusion through engagement in events that encourage residents and visitors from varying diversity dimensions and backgrounds to attend or participate;
- 2. Focus on event ideas that encourage involvement of participants from outside of traditional neighborhood footprint and different from immediate peer group;
- 3. Be incorporated as a component of a larger event if measurable diversity outcomes can be identified;
- 4. Not be used for political candidates, petitions, issues, or lobbying activities.

RE: 2024 Social Service Funding Awards

The Community Development Department has completed its review of the grant applications it received from organizations seeking 2024 Social Service grant funding from the City. The final grant funding awards for each project are listed on the attached table and an outline of each project is also enclosed. The City received applications from seven (7) different nonprofit organizations seeking support for nine (9) different programs or activities totaling \$154,307.16. Seven (7) projects were funded in full, totaling \$61,944.16. Two (2) programs were not funded as they did not meet the criteria for the grant. The total amount of funding available is \$65,000. These projects provide a myriad of needed supportive services for Kent residents, including counseling, programs for the homeless and free legal assistance.

Staff will draft 2024 Social Service agreements and submit any that require Board of Control approval under separate cover.

2024 Social Service Program -- Outline of Proposals

Applicant: Coleman Health Services

Program: Eviction Prevention/Housing Start-ups

- Amount Recommended: \$14,000
- The Eviction Prevention/Housing Start-up program provides direct assistance (for rent, utility payments or security deposits) for persons with a severe and persistent mental illness to obtain housing or to avoid being evicted from housing. Once housing is obtained or stabilized, these individuals receive ongoing supportive services to maintain housing.

Applicant: Community Legal Aid Services, Inc. Program: Legal Assistance for Kent Residents

- Amount Recommended: \$6,000
- This program administers legal counsel/representation for low-income clients who cannot afford private legal counsel. Many types of legal assistance are available including legal matters relating to: social security, housing, consumer matters, domestic violence, child abuse and general advice to avoid legal problems.

Applicant: AxessPointe Community Health Centers Program: Housing and Emergency Support Services (HESS)

- Amount Recommended: \$10,000
- The HESS program supplies direct assistance (rent arrears or deposits) to obtain housing or to avoid being evicted from housing. If needed, once housing is secured or stabilized, individuals may receive ongoing supportive services/case management to maintain housing.

Applicant: AxessPointe Community Health Centers Program: Portage Area Recovery Center

- Amount Recommended: \$5,000
- This program will reimburse costs associated with provision of supportive services and overall case management for women who are recovering from addiction at the Portage Area Recovery Center.

Applicant: AxessPointe Community Health Centers Program: Safer Futures

- Amount Recommended: \$7,000
- Safer Futures is a domestic violence shelter that assists women and children who are victims of domestic violence by providing safe shelter and taking measures to meet the basic needs of its residents. Shelter staff coordinates client intakes; provides support services, case management, goal planning, advocacy, and connections for legal help.

2024 Social Service Program -- Outline of Proposals (continued)

Applicant: Lovelight, Inc.

Program: Building Community, Building Futures - Youth Component

- Amount Recommended: \$11,174.46
- Provides activities and programming for youth after school and as part of the summer. It includes weekly, outdoor, after school activities when the weather is warm enough during the school year and summer activities that may include games, crafts, art, music, personal development and esteem building experiences.
- Tutoring PLUS sessions will be offered twice a week during the school year at the Villages at Franklin.

Applicant: Portage Metropolitan Housing Authority Program: Good Neighbor Program

- Amount Recommended: \$8,769.70
- PMHA's Social Service Coordinator organizes the various aspects of the program. This includes encouraging public housing residents to be observant in their neighborhoods related to crime, nuisances or maintenance issues; there is outreach with the KPD public info officer related to crime and reporting. Other services provided to PMHA residents include: employment, budgeting and self-improvement programming. Plans also include helping residents plan, plant, harvest and maintain community gardens.


