ANALYSIS:

Page 2 Board of Zoning Appeals Staff Report February 18, 2013 meeting

This property is located at 122 West College Street and is currently zoned C-D: Commercial – Downtown. This property was formally home to Raley Upholstery. The applicants are requesting variances to allow a total of two building signs that will exceed the maximum square footage allowed.

This property is now home to Kent Karate. The applicants would like to install two signs on the building; one facing West College Street and one that faces Haymaker Parkway (State Route 59). Each sign is approximately 48 square feet in size, and will consist of painted letters and channel letters installed on the building. The applicant explains that the signs will be easier for the members to locate the facility and will help to attract new clients. They also explain the signs need to be larger for better readability at a greater distance. The second sign on the rear of the building will help both existing and new clients to locate the building from Haymaker Parkway.

The City of Kent Zoning Ordinances states that businesses in the C-D district are allowed one building sign, one projecting sign, and one permanent window sign. The maximum square footage allowed for all of the signs is 50 square feet.

Doug Wagener called to order the Health Board Meeting of January 8, 2013 at 5:31 p.m.

The minutes from the December 2012 meeting were distributed and reviewed by the Health Board members prior to the meeting.

Motion:

A motion to approve the minutes from the December 2012 meeting was made by Marchelle Bobbs and seconded by Pam Freeman. The motion passed.

Open Comments

We received 1 letter objecting to the fee increase for food service operations from Henry Wahner's. No Food Service Operators attended the meeting.

Guest Speakers

Jeff Neistadt stated he invited Ken Slenkovich, Elizabeth James, Josh Filla, and John Hoornbeek to the Health Board meeting to discuss Phase I of the Draft Portage County Community Health Needs Assessment. Elizabeth James presented on the background methodology. She reviewed with the Board an overview of data sources, methods, and review findings. She touched on the County Health Rankings and key health indicators. Elizabeth explained comparison points and gave a list of our peer counties that compare to us in size, race/ethnicity, age and poverty levels.

Motion:

A motion was made by Chris Woolverton and seconded by Marchelle Bobbs to approve the Expenditures and Encumbrances for the month of December 2012. The motion passed.

Commissioner's Report

Enclosed in the Health Board packet were several articles regarding the Ravenna City Health Department and the closing of their immunization clinic as well as them eyeing a merger with the Portage County Health Department.

A letter was enclosed in the Board packet from the food service operation Henry Wahner's against the raising of the food service operation fees.

Trust for American's Health has released their annual report on disaster preparedness. Ohio scored 6 out of 10 on the annual report. No state had a perfect score. 8 out of 10 was the highest score. Deficiencies included a lack of funding commitment for public health programs from the state health department, health system preparedness, extreme weather event preparedness, and infectious disease control and vaccinations.

A Notice of Violation from the EPA was attached regarding the Health Department's former Industrial Pretreatment Program which is now under the Service Department. The letter identified 14 violations that require corrective action. The program was noted as having serious deficiencies due to past neglect and is working on bringing the IPP back into compliance with state and federal requirements. Due to this letter and the numerous violations, I have allowed the Service Department to utilize the Environmental Technician for 32 hours per week until a plan of action is developed addressing these

violations as unfortunately they occurred under the former management of this department.

At the December 20th immunization clinic, we provided a total of 13 shots to the public including 5 flu shots.

I met with Kent State University regarding several discrepancies in the licensing of their food service operations. As of March 1st of this year, all of their locations will be properly licensed according to their Risk Level Classifications.

Kyle Kelly and I attended the Portage Prepares meeting and will represent the City of Kent in future meetings regarding Emergency Preparedness in the county.

We have received a demo from Health Space which is going to be our new Environmental Health Data System for the department. The demo will provide opportunities for staff to become oriented and learn how to operate the new system.

Due to increased flu activity in the area, the Akron Regional Hospital Association including Robinson Memorial has restricted visitation in order to provide additional protection to patients.

I would like board approval for a letter of support to apply for accreditation readiness funding. Awards range from \$5,000 to \$15,000 and are due on January 23.

And finally, this is Pam Freeman's last Health Board meeting as a Board of Health member.

Old Business

Third Reading of the Food Service Fees Increase

Motion:

A motion was made by Susan Roxburgh and seconded by Pam Freeman approve the Resolution No. 2013-001 increasing the local license fees for Food Service Operation and Retail Food Establishment in the Kent City Health. This resolution was approved by roll call vote; Freeman-Aye; Roxburgh-Aye; Bobbs-Aye; Woolverton-Aye; Amrhein-Aye; Wagener-Aye. The motion passed.

Indigent Burial

Jeff stated that the Indigent Burial application has been reworked, to include a more detailed request for information to allow for a better determination of indigent status of an applicant.

Motion:

A motion was made by Chris Woolverton and seconded by Jack Amrhein to accept the amended Indigent Burial Application Form. With no objection, the motion passed.

New Business

Accreditation Readiness Funding Grant

Motion:

A motion was made by Chris Woolverton and seconded Marchelle Bobbs to approve a letter of support and application for the Health Commissioner to apply for Accreditation Readiness Funding Grant. The motion passed.

Swimming Pool Cost Analysis

Jeff stated that swimming pool license fees have been \$150.00 for several years now. In order for license fees to pay for the program, they would need to be raised to \$350.00.

Motion:

A motion was made by Susan Roxhburgh and seconded by Marchelle Bobbs to phase in a swimming pool license fee increase beginning with \$250.00 for 2013, and then raising them each season by \$50 until they reach the \$350 dollar mark. With no objection, the motion passed.

Composting

Jeff stated that currently the City does not have an ordinance or a policy on composting. An Ordinance has been drafted; Section 783.12 Composting, outlining the definition of Composting and the regulations. A brochure has also been developed as a guide on how to and what to compost, as well as how to make an approved compost bin.

THE HARVEY REDMOND BRIDGE

Harvey is unhappy. Why are people taking his name in vain? What is taking so long to replace the Harvey Redmond Bridge?

In 1947 when the bridge was built, they didn't need any permits...they simply built it. They drove telephone poles into the river bed and in five spans crossed the river to open up the isolated parcel that was trapped between the Cuyahoga and the CSX Railroad. The steel was even coated with lead based paint so it would last a long time. Thankfully it did!





City of Kent 6-Year Strategic Trending

For Key Strategic Priority Objectives (2007-2012)



In the last 6 years the Kent community has made steady progress towards achieving its strategic goals. This report outlines the collective actions which are behind the trend lines illustrated in the chart above.

The pace of progress has varied among the 8 strategic categories but it is encouraging to see positive steps underway across the board. As a testament to City Council's leadership productivity, it is worth noting that those areas where Council devoted the most time and resources – economic development and City University synergy – also witnessed the most rapid rate of success.

Demonstrating the capacity to bring a leadership focus, make hard decisions, and deliver results has been critical to gaining the public confidence necessary to rally community resources and inspire an optimistic outlook for Kent's future. That sense of optimism has proven to be the intangible ingredient behind Kent's positive strategic trajectory, as momentum has grown in Kent's favor and each success increases the probability of more successes.

One of the unifying themes of the City's strategic objectives is collaboration – building partner networks, pooling resources, aligning intent and leveraging assets for mutual gain. This concept was put to the test in downtown redevelopment and it's no surprise to see the two trend lines of economic development and university synergy topping the chart (in green). These high flyers bode well for future endeavors as the partnership formula looks to be applied into the other areas of strategic importance.

The middle cluster of trend lines (in yellow) shows positive gains as well, albeit at a more moderate pace, which is perhaps to be expected as these are core function areas that tend to be the stabilizing components of the community; so disruptive change is not necessarily as favorable an outcome as steady progress.

Lastly, financial health has at last begun to show some signs of recovery with a significant jump in jobs and income taxes ending 2012. City finances are typically lagging indicators but the City's investments produced a 12.1% rise in income taxes in 2012, providing some validation that an economic recovery is underway in Kent.

Since 2007 Kent has dealt with its fair share of setbacks, frustrations and delays, but in the end it is clear that by holding true to our strategic path and sustaining a focus on our goals, we did what had not been done for decades – most notably we pushed through some long-standing community milestones highlighted by the construction of the new downtown redevelopment and the imminent completion of the restoration of the old hotel.
