The City is preparing its funding request for the PY2018 Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG). The funding request is submitted to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) on an annual basis and must include a list of proposed programs that will be implemented with CDBG funding during the year. The City's PY2018 CDBG allocation has not yet been determined by HUD, but it is anticipated the City will receive around the same level of CDBG funding allocated in PY2017, which was \$248,453. A total of seven (7) project proposals were received this year seeking CDBG funding assistance and the total amount of funding requested was \$466,390. Based on a review of these proposals and in consideration of all applicable CDBG regulatory requirements, staff is recommending Council approval of the below projects and amounts at its May meeting. Formal approval in May allows time for a public comment period and a second public hearing to take place prior to authorization.

1. City of Kent, Engineering Department - Walnut Street Reconstruction

This activity provides funding to assist with the design and full depth reconstruction of Walnut Street from Cherry Street to Dodge Street. The work involves new sidewalks, concrete curb and gutter, a waterline replacement and storm sewers to improve drainage along the roadway. This is a multi-year project and construction is scheduled for 2020 (Phase 1 – Cherry to Harris) and 2021 (Phase 2 – Harris to Dodge).

Funding Requested: \$170,000

Funding Recommended: \$100,000

PY2017 CDBG Funding: \$0

2. City of Kent, Parks & Recreation - Hike/Bike Trail Design (Brady's Leap Segment)

This activity will provide funding to assist with design costs associated with this segment that connects the Main Street Bridge to just south of the Fairchild Bridge. Design costs are an eligible CDBG expense, but overall eligibility is contingent upon actual construction of the project. Construction of this portion of the trail is anticipated to take place in 2019.

Funding Requested: \$25,000

Funding Recommended: \$10,000

PY2017 CDBG Funding: \$10,000

3. City of Kent, Police Department - Neighborhood Policing Program

The Neighborhood Policing Program provides additional patrols and police visibility primarily in low-to-moderate income neighborhoods and in assisted housing complexes. The program has a goal of improving communication, trust and understanding between residents and the Police Department. Funding for this activity is counted toward the Public Service 15% funding limitation.

Funding Requested: \$24,000 Funding Recommended: \$18,000

PY2017 CDBG Funding: \$10,000

4. CAC of Portage County - Furnace Inspection/Targeted Replacement Program

The applicant is requesting funding from the CDBG program to continue its "Kent Furnace Inspection/Targeted Replacement Program" that provides the services of furnace inspections, tune-ups, or the replacement of failing or inefficient furnaces and/or hot water tanks for low-to-moderate income Kent households.

Funding Requested: \$35,000 Funding Recommended: \$35,000

PY2017 CDBG Funding: \$35,000

5. Family & Community Services – Homeless Shelter Services

The Homeless Shelter Services program provides services at Miller Community House an emergency homeless shelter. Funding helps pay for shelter nights spent by Kent residents including needed case management, counseling and housing placement. Funding for this activity is counted toward the Public Service 15% funding limitation.

Funding Requested: \$15,000 Funding Recommended: \$15,000

PY2017 CDBG Funding: \$15,000

6. Family & Community Services - Kentway Senior Apartments Rehabilitation

Family & Community Services acquired the Kentway Apartments in late 2017. In total, Kentway has 141 units of affordable housing available for seniors. Currently, 4 of those units are in need of extensive repairs before they can be available for rent. Requested funding would be used for full rehab of these units, including needed structural repairs to the floors, as well as mitigating asbestos in the floor tiles. Once the repairs are made the units will be available to income eligible seniors.

Funding Requested: \$168,390 Funding Recommended: \$30,000 PY2017 CDBG Funding: \$0

7. Coleman Professional Services - Longmere House Foundation/Chimney Repairs

This project proposes needed foundation and chimney repairs to a duplex owned by Coleman Professional Services (CPS). The duplex provides housing to two (2) low- to moderate-income residents with mental disabilities. In addition to stable housing, residents are connected with mental health services though CPS.

Funding Requested: \$10,000 PY2017 CDBG Funding: \$0

Funding Recommended: \$8,453

8. City of Kent, Community Development - Administration

These funds are used to cover grant administration costs such as the cost of staff, supplies, advertising, postage, copying, travel costs for trainings, and other related costs. Funding for this activity is counted toward the Planning and Administration 20% funding limitation.

Funding Requested: \$0 PY2017 CDBG Funding: \$4,000

Fair Housing Consultant Fair Housing Services

These funds will be used to cover the cost associated with the provision of fair housing service. The consultant will provide counseling in the areas of housing discrimination and landlord-tenant issues. They'll investigate fair housing complaints and provide a variety of public education and outreach services in the City. Funding for this activity is counted toward the Planning and Administration 20% funding limitation.

Dear Mayor Fiala:

A recommendation from the Ohio Department of Transportation's long range plan, Access Ohio 2040, is to coordinate efforts with local jurisdictions to designate Ohio's first U.S. and State Bike Route network. This network will be similar to the interstate and state route system of highways. ODOT intends to have 5 U.S. bike routes and 18 state bike routes, and four of these proposed routes, USBR 21, SRB 70, SRB 1 and SRB 85 is planned to follow roadways that are under your jurisdiction.

Please note the following items about this proposed bike route network. The routes:

- Are intended for use by long distance, experienced commuters
- Generally will connect communities or points of interest
- Are a combination of trails and on-road facilities
- Will use facilities that are available today
- Are not a recreational route
- **Are not** a construction project
- Are not a wish list for future roadway or trail improvements

Included with this letter is a map showing the proposed bike route in your region. SBR70 is the Portage Hike and Bike Trail and shared road path along Water St. and Franklin Ave through the City of Kent. The proposed route has been coordinated with other area communities, planning agencies, park boards and committees, some elected officials and bicycle advocate. In addition, the routes have been driven by car to ensure they are appropriate for their intent. If you desire to modify the proposed routes, please let me know.

ODOT's is actively seeking to complete the official designation of these routes. They are available to view on our TIMs website, by selecting 'roadway information' then 'active bike routes' link here http://gis.dot.state.oh.us/tims/map ODOT may eventually place signs along the routes, at no cost to your agency.





EAST MAIN STREET AREA AGREEMENT

KENT STATE UNIVERSITY AND THE CITY OF KENT

ALL PARTIES BEING IN THE COUNTY OF PORTAGE, STATE OF OHIO

WHEREAS, both the City and KSU desire to protect and enhance the residential neighborhoods located north of East Main Street by limiting through traffic and enhance pedestrian and bike connectivity to the public amenities on campus; and

WHEREAS, the university's Campus Master Plan, adopted on _____, includes the potential construction of new academic and parking facilities, and the elimination of existing surface parking along this same section of Main Street; and

WHEREAS, KSU and the City desire to improve the safety along East Main Street from Willow Street to Horning Road and provide better connectivity for pedestrians between KSU and residential neighborhoods adjacent to the University and north of East Main Street; and

WHEREAS, East Main Street from Willow Street to Luther Avenue is the highest roadway crash section in Kent, as ranked by the Akron Metropolitan Area Transportation Study (AMATS) from 2013-2015 crash data; and

WHEREAS, the intersection of East Main Street and Lincoln Street is the second (2nd) highest crash intersection in Kent, as ranked by the AMATS from 2013-2015 crash data; and

WHEREAS, there were seven (7) reported pedestrian crashes and two (2) reported bicycle crashes, from 2010-2012, along East Main Street between Lincoln Street and Midway Drive as documented by AMATS; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to hire a consultant to assist them in planning improvements and addressing safety and neighborhood concerns involving the East Main Street area as set forth in this Agreement; and

THEREFORE, The City and KSU commit to collaborate and partner to initiate a strategic and transformational corridor project that will require planning and the pursuit of funding for the eventual design, right of way acquisition and construction of improvements along the East Main Street corridor. The goal of the project is to assure all improvements are planned with input from the residents and businesses along East Main Street, and are designed to enhance traffic flow, safety and the residential feel of neighborhoods along East Main Street. At this time each party agrees to the following:

City:

- Take the lead role in a planning process to address the safety and neighborhood protection/enhancements needs along East Main Street. The planning process will be conducted with the participation and input from the residential and business community, especially the neighborhoods located across East Main Street.
- Jointly with KSU, hire a consultant to assist in the planning process.
- The City shall fund 50% of the planning consultant's services, up to \$25,000.
- Pursue outside funding for the completion of the project.

KSU:

- Assist the City in the planning process to determine improvements along and adjacent to East Main Street to address the safety needs and neighborhood protection/enhancements needs.
- Jointly with the City, hire a consultant to assist in the planning process.
- KSU shall fund 50% of the planning consultant's services, up to \$25,000.
- Pursue outside funding for the completion of the project.

Schedule:

The City and KSU will diligently pursue hiring the consultant and thereafter completion of the planning process in an effort to complete process by July, 2018. This date can be adjusted by the mutual agreement of both parties. In addition, both parties will continually pursue outside funding sources until the project is completed or abandoned by both parties.

In following the instructions of City Council to develop a Climate Action Plan (CAP) in response to the resolution in support of the Paris Climate Agreement, the Kent Sustainability Commission has organized an internal ad-hoc committee of community stakeholders including members of the Kent Environmental Council, Kent State University Office of Sustainability, and Davey Resource Group.

The ad-hoc committee met for the first time in December 2017 and currently meets once a month to discuss the CAP goals, process, and framework. The development of the plan is expected to take between 12-18 months. Once completed, the CAP will be reviewed and finalized by the Kent Sustainability Commission and recommended to City Council to be considered for adoption.

The CAP will include a set of community-based strategies intended to guide efforts and incentivize actions to limit the magnitude or rate of climate change. Additionally, the CAP will include a framework to inventory and analyze greenhouse gas emissions in Kent and set short and long term goals for local emission reduction accomplished through an incentive-based implementation plan.

Community meetings are proposed for Spring and Summer 2018 to incorporate community expectations and perceptions as well as provide the ad-hoc committee with feedback to establish a foundation for developing solutions to local issues.

This memorandum serves as an update. No action is needed at this time.

North Water Street - HSP Grant Application

The Engineering Division is requesting Council's approval to submit to the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) a grant request to improve North Water Street from Main Street to Brady Street. This section of North Water Street is currently the 3rd highest crash roadway segment in Kent per AMATS. This ranking makes the segment of roadway eligible for the Highway Safety Program (HSP) administered by ODOT. The program is intended to fund improvements that would reduce crashes and crash severity. The improvements proposed along North Water Street would address the following issues along the corridor that have been transmitted to the Engineering Division:

- Vehicular and pedestrian safety concerns (3rd highest crash segment in Kent per AMATS)
- · Lack of safe crosswalks at Portage and Columbus Street
- Higher vehicular speeds on North Water Street (85th percentile speed is 30 mph)
- Improving poor sight distance turning from Columbus onto Water Street
- Reconfigure parking along Water Street to maximize spaces
- Restrict lane widths to standard sizes to reduce speeds, shorten pedestrian crossings and reduce crashes caused by vehicle confusion.
- Lack of pedestrian level lighting
- Poor pavement condition
